Missions and Christian Community Development

Getting ready to participate on a short-term mission trip or work locally? Interested in learning more about the principles of Christian Community Development while serving locally or internationally? This class will equip and empower you to participate or to further explore being part of an international trip. Been on a short term trip? This class is for you, too. Come share and build on those experiences. The sessions are informal and participatory. Lessons covered in the class: Principles of Christian Community Development; Cross-Cultural Relationships; Identifying Assets and Inspiring Hope; Mobilizing the Church for Holistic Ministry; Best Practices in Medical Missions; When Helping Hurts; Storying for Oral Learners; and Worldview and Development.

Embracing Spiritual Awakening by Diana Butler Bass

Almost half of the population of the United States says that they are spiritual and religious, but they want to meet their spiritual needs in new and deeper ways than they find in current religious institutions. More than half a century later, these talks continue to retain their poignancy. First heard as informal radio broadcasts on the BBC, the lectures were published as three books and subsequently combined as *Mere Christianity*. C. S. Lewis proves that "at the center of each there is something, or a Someone, who against all divergences of belief, all differences of temperament, all memories of mutual persecution, speaks with the same voice," rejecting the boundaries that divide Christianity's many denominations. This twentieth century masterpiece provides an unequalled opportunity for believers and nonbelievers alike to hear a powerful, rational case for the Christian faith.

The Daniel Plan: 40 Days to a Healthier Life



A Community Together On Mission

WE ARE INVITING PEOPLE TO BECOME A PART OF OUR COMMUNITY SO THAT THEY CAN ENCOUNTER JESUS AND BEGIN TO BELIEVE IN WHO HE IS.

In March of this year, Young Adult Ministry at St. Luke transitioned away from our weekly worship service on Thursday nights. The service was going well, people were being connected to the community, and we were having between 30 and 40 people gather to worship God every week. Overall the Young Adult Leadership Team (myself included) viewed Thursday Night Worship as a great success. So why did we decide to stop doing it every week?

When I came to St. Luke, I was tasked with growing our ministry that reaches out to young adults (people between the ages of 18-35). This is a demographic that most churches in America are struggling to reach. We started with a four-fold approach that included Worship (Thursday Night Worship), Grow (small group Bible studies), Connect (events intended to build community) and Serve (service/outreach opportunities). This four-fold strategy gave a strong identity to the young adult community that already existed at St. Luke and we have seen some significant growth in this area.

As we continued to evaluate our strategy after the first year of its implementation, one thing became really clear. Most of what we did in the first year of ministry required that someone come to the church building in order to be a part of the community. Our events were 'attractional' in nature. We hoped that some element of the event, be it food, good music or community, would attract people to come to St. Luke's church building where they could be connected.

While this model was effective at reaching people who already considered themselves Christians and were looking for a Christian community to be a part of, we noticed that there was an important demographic that this model was not reaching—people who don't know Christ. As the culture in United States shifts away from

a Judeo-Christian worldview, more and more young people are questioning the place of religion, specifically Christianity, in their lives. Our facilities are state of the art, our worship services include contemporary music and engaging teaching, and yet there is a growing demographic of people who will never engage Jesus for the first time by coming to a worship service in a church building.

As the Young Adult Leadership Team discussed and prayed about this reality, one thing became really clear: we needed to find some model of ministry that allowed for non-Christians who would never feel comfortable in a church building to interact with and join the community. And so in March of this year, we transitioned away from the attractional model of ministry and into a Missional Community model.

The basic idea is that the young adult community that has been built over the past year and a half can become missionaries to our own city of Lexington. By relocating into homes and public spaces, our community can begin to interact with and include people who would not feel comfortable in our church building. We operate under the principle that people will belong to a community before they believe. Just like the disciples joined Jesus' mission before they believed who He was, we are inviting people to become a part of our community so that they can encounter Jesus and begin to believe in who He is.

After four months of trying this model of ministry we are learning a great deal, and adding people to our community. We are excited to see the long-term fruit of this ministry and continue to press into being a community that is living our lives on mission in Lexington.

St. Luke has been a Stephen Ministry congregation since 2001. During its 13 year history, over 60 persons have completed the required 50 hour training. Stephen Ministers commit to a two year period of service. A number of St. Luke's Stephen Ministers continue to serve long beyond that time. Nearly 150 persons have been served in some way. Some assignments are only for a few months and some have continued for as much as six to eight years. Stephen Ministers are trained to walk along side persons experiencing a life challenge and needs or desires a one-to-one Christian friend to be a confidential listener and encourager.
